THE ROGER CLEMENS AWARD

COLLEGE BASEBALL'S PITCHER OF THE YEAR

HOUSTON – Sixty-two of the best pitchers in collegiate baseball, including 11 who earned all-America status in 2006, have been named to the preseason watch list for the fourth annual Roger Clemens Award.

Heading the list is 2006 first-team all-America reliever **Cole St.Clair** of Rice, who as a sophomore helped the Owls to a deep College World Series run in Omaha, Neb., last June with a 7-2 record, 1.82 earned run average and 11 saves. With the USA National team which won the FISU World University Championship in Havana, Cuba, St.Clair was 4-0 with a 0.69 ERA and three saves.

Also on the preseason list is Vanderbilt all-America **David Price**, named *Baseball America's* summer player of the year. The 6-6 left-hander was 5-1 with a 0.20 ERA and 61 strikeouts for Team USA.

Second-team selections from 2006 named to the '07 watch list are **Sean Doolittle** of Virginia, **Jake Arrieta** of Texas Christian, **Joshua Fields** of Georgia, and **Nick Chigges** of the College of Charleston.

Players for 23 NCAA Division 1 conferences are on the list, including 10 players each from the Atlantic Coast and Southeastern conferences. Twelve schools have two players listed: Alabama, Arkansas, Army, Notre Dame, Ohio State, Pepperdine, Rice, TCU, Texas, Tulane, UC-Irvine and Wichita State.

Previous winners of the Roger Clemens Award were **Jered Weaver** of Long Beach State (2004), **Luke Hochevar** of Tennessee (2005) and **Andrew Miller** of North Carolina (2006).

The finalists for the 2007 Roger Clemens Award will be selected in voting by a national panel that includes: all Division 1 head baseball coaches, a selection of national media who cover collegiate baseball, the 16 winners of the R. E. "Bob" Smith Award, which was presented to the top player in the country in Houston in 1988-2003. In addition, the 10 previous finalists for the Clemens Award are also issued ballots. The 2007 award will be presented at a gala dinner next July.

The Roger Clemens Award was named after future Hall of Famer **Roger Clemens**, who began his march to stardom while leading the University of Texas to the College World Series title in 1983. As a major leaguer, Clemens has won 348 games (eighth best in history), fanned more than 4,600 hitters and won seven Cy Young Awards, emblematic as the top pitcher in his league. The Roger Clemens Award is the only award of its kind, honoring the finest pitchers in college baseball.

The event is administered by the Greater Houston Baseball Association, which has donated more than \$300,000 to the charities from the net proceeds from the first three dinners. The GHBA is a non-profit 501.3 (C) organization dedicated to the growth of amateur baseball in the Houston area.
